
My Fellow Kansans:

Created in 2006 by statutory mandate, a primary function of the ANE Unit is to increase awareness, reporting and prosecution of abuse, neglect and exploitation of children and vulnerable adults in Kansas. Staffed by a Unit Coordinator and an Office Specialist, the Unit received over 1400 reports during this reporting period. These reports are in the form of findings issued by other state agencies and are also generated by constituent concerns.

In order to effectively determine actions and outcomes of these reports, the Unit is dependent upon the assistance of other agencies to supply information. Therefore, we thank the Kansas Department on Aging, Kansas Department of Health and Environment and the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services for their response. In addition, we appreciate the assistance of district and county attorneys and local law enforcement agencies throughout the state of Kansas for sharing information. It is imperative that we continue to work together to protect Kansas citizens, and we recognize all of these agencies for their willingness to continue to collaborate on effective means to do so.



K.S.A. 75-723
Chapter 75.—STATE DEPARTMENTS; PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES
Article 7.—ATTORNEY GENERAL

75-723. Abuse, neglect and exploitation unit; confidentiality of investigations; reports forwarded to unit; report to legislature; rules and regulations; prohibition on use of funds; contracting. (a) There is hereby created in the office of the attorney general an abuse, neglect and exploitation of persons unit.

(b) Except as provided by subsection (h), the information obtained and the investigations conducted by the unit shall be confidential as required by state or federal law. Upon request of the unit, the unit shall have access to all records of reports, investigation documents and written reports of findings related to confirmed cases of abuse, neglect or exploitation of persons or cases in which there is reasonable suspicion to believe abuse, neglect or exploitation of persons has occurred which are received or generated by the department of social and rehabilitation services, department on aging or department of health and environment.

(c) Except for reports alleging only self-neglect, such state agency receiving reports of abuse, neglect or exploitation of persons shall forward to the unit:

(1) Within 10 days of confirmation, reports of findings concerning the confirmed abuse, neglect or exploitation of persons; and

(2) Within 10 days of such denial, each report of an investigation in which such state agency was denied the opportunity or ability to conduct or complete a full investigation of abuse, neglect or exploitation of persons.

(d) On or before the first day of the regular legislative session each year, the unit shall submit to the legislature a written report of the unit's activities, investigations and findings for the preceding fiscal year.

(e) The attorney general shall adopt rules and regulations as deemed appropriate for the administration of this section.

(f) No state funds appropriated to support the provisions of the abuse, neglect or exploitation of persons unit and expended to contract with any third party shall be used by a third party to file any civil action against the state of Kansas or any agency of the state of Kansas. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the attorney general from initiating or participating in any civil action against any party.

(g) The attorney general may contract with other agencies or organizations to provide services related to the investigation or litigation of findings related to abuse, neglect or exploitation of persons.


(h) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, nothing shall prohibit the attorney general or the unit from distributing or utilizing only that information obtained pursuant to a confirmed case of abuse, neglect or exploitation or cases in which there is reasonable suspicion to believe abuse, neglect or exploitation has occurred pursuant to this section with any third party contracted with by the attorney general to carry out the provisions of this section.

ACTIVITIES, INVESTIGATIONS AND FINDINGS

For the period of July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010, the ANE Unit received 1332 reports of substantiated or confirmed abuse, neglect or exploitation from Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS), Kansas Department on Aging (KDOA) and Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE). The reports consisted of 1033 from SRS Children and Family Services (CFS), 230 from SRS Adult Protective Services (APS), 64 from KDOA, and 5 from KDHE.



SRS Children and Family Services (CFS) - Social workers investigate reports of child abuse, including physical injury, physical neglect, emotional injury or sexual acts inflicted upon a child. <http://www.srs.ks.gov>

SRS Adult Protective Services (APS) - Social workers investigate reports and provide protective services to adults, with their consent, who reside in the community, adults residing in facilities licensed/certified by Social and Rehabilitation Services, and to adults residing in adult care homes and other facilities licensed by the Kansas Department on Aging, when the alleged perpetrator is not a resident or employee of the facility. APS also investigates caregivers providing services to home and community based service (HCBS) clients. <http://www.srs.ks.gov>

KDOA - Investigates reports of adult abuse, neglect and exploitation occurring in adult care homes (ACH). Examples: nursing home facilities, assisted living facilities, boarding care. <http://www.agingkansas.org>

KDHE - Investigates reports of adult abuse, neglect and exploitation occurring in medical facilities and non-long term care facilities. Examples: hospitals, ambulatory surgery centers, home health agencies, hospice, rural health clinics, outpatient physical therapy, portable x-ray units. <http://www.kdheks.gov>

In addition to the reports of confirmed or substantiated abuse, the ANE Unit also receives what have been classified as “other” reports. These are reports where investigations may have been originally denied or hindered and are generated by contacts from law enforcement, SRS, KDOA, KDHE, legislators, or private citizens. The ANE Unit frequently receives complaints, concerns, or questions from the public. For the period of July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010 the ANE Unit received 72 “other” reports. Of the 72 “other” reports, 40 were child abuse related and 32 were adult abuse related. Reports of confirmed or substantiated abuse combined with “other” reports reviewed accounted for a total of 1073 reports of child abuse and 356 reports of adult abuse for a total of 1429 cases. Reports can involve more than one victim and/or more than one perpetrator. Also received for review were 24 corrective actions issued by KDHE; these do not rise to the level of a confirmed finding. These are included in the total reports received of 1429.

More than 88% of the reports received by the ANE Unit originated with either SRS Children and Family Services (CFS) or Adult Protective Services (APS). Slightly more than 5% came from various “other” sources, more than 4% came from KDOA, and just more than 2% were from KDHE. (Figure A)

Child ANE comprised 75% of all reports received. The remaining reports were on vulnerable adults over age 18. (Figure B)





In situations where unreported abuse is alleged, persons contacting the ANE Unit are encouraged to report directly to the proper investigative entity. When appropriate, referrals are made to the correct protection reporting center and to local law enforcement.

Complaints and concerns are explored to determine whether a report was received by the appropriate agency and the investigation is progressing as expected or could be aided by intervention.

The ANE Unit regularly serves as a liaison, coordinating with local law enforcement, county and district attorneys, SRS, KDOA, KDHE and the general public as is possible within state and federal confidentiality restrictions. This exchange provides an important constituent service and oversight function. The process allows for considerable insight into the functioning of each partner and often serves to educate the public as to roles and responsibilities of each.

The ANE Unit consistently informs citizens that information obtained as a result of inquiries on their behalf cannot be shared with them. The follow up completed regarding their report does provide a source of collateral information and an outlet for their concern. The interaction and follow up information obtained also serves to help assess the impact of current policies and procedures on victims and their families.

Ongoing discussions are held with state agency representatives to review policies, practices and procedures and to discuss system improvement and staff performance.

Progress toward establishing working relationships and developing consistent reporting to meet statutory requirements continues. The ANE Unit would not be serving the citizens of Kansas should it simply serve as a rubber stamp for work already completed. Our inquiries reveal that there is need for system improvement and for the continued education and development of individuals who work within it. At the same time it is important to clearly state that the vast majority of cases reviewed were handled within an expected range of outcomes.

The ANE Unit is dependent upon the information supplied by cooperating agencies as data is collected to meet the statutory requirements of this unit. Even after its fourth year, the unit continues to identify and refine variables for reporting. We strive to cultivate positive working relationships with community agencies and express gratitude to those who, in addition to their daily duties, take time out of their schedules to answer inquiries and provide information on outcomes. We recognize each piece of the wheel serves a different function while maintaining a common goal: to move forward. Though we may identify gaps in service and a need for system improvement, it is only through communication and continued collaboration that we can all focus on keeping Kansas families safe.


This report provides case examples to illustrate identified areas of concern and is not meant to be an all-inclusive list of every such case received during the reporting year.

Findings recorded for the 1033 substantiated reports of child abuse include abandonment, emotional abuse, lack of supervision, medical neglect, physical abuse, physical neglect, and sexual abuse. Some reports contained substantiations of more than one type of abuse. Sexual abuse was the most frequently substantiated form of abuse. Compared to last year's findings, the following variances are noted:



Abandonment	increased 0.03%
Emotional Abuse	increased 3.02%
Lack of Supervision	increased 1.13%
Medical Neglect	decreased 1.26%
Physical Abuse	increased 0.15%
Physical Neglect	decreased 0.92%
Sexual Abuse	decreased 1.67%

Findings recorded for the confirmed reports of adult abuse include physical abuse, exploitation, fiduciary abuse, and neglect. Some reports contained confirmations of more than one type of abuse. Nearly all the exploitation reports were related to financial exploitation. Fiduciary abuse is another type of financial abuse. It is distinguished by the perpetrator being a person who stands in a position of trust, very often someone given power of attorney. By combining both financial exploitation and fiduciary abuse, the most frequently confirmed type of abuse was financial abuse of vulnerable adults, most often seniors. Abuse findings declined 8.85% since last year, while financial abuse findings rose 6.74% and neglect findings declined 4.26%.

The following are examples of investigations with which the ANE Unit became involved to affect a change in outcome:

Lack of Agency Communication

In numerous cases the ANE Unit obtained and facilitated delivery of information that was needed by SRS, KDOA, KDHE, local law enforcement, or county or district attorneys to assure that the case received full consideration.

In support:

- An officer with a local police department within Sedgwick County was investigating a case of Fiduciary Abuse confirmed by SRS. Upon the Unit initiating inquiry regarding the status of a criminal investigation, the officer followed up seeking information about the most appropriate statutory violations. The Unit was able to put the officer in touch with an investigator who routinely worked such crimes. Subsequently, the officer completed his investigation and the perpetrator was charged with Felony Mistreatment of a Dependant Adult.
- An employee of an adult care facility in Johnson County was witnessed by a facility nurse to strike a resident in the abdomen with his fist. Though the facility failed to report the incident to law enforcement, KDOA did so upon issuing their finding. However, when the Unit contacted local law enforcement to confirm receipt of this information and the status of a criminal investigation, none was found. The Unit was able to facilitate further exchange of information between agencies that resulted in law enforcement completing an investigation and the perpetrator being charged with Battery.
- SRS issued a finding confirming fiduciary abuse of an adult residing in a care center in Butler County. Upon follow up with the local law enforcement agency regarding the status of a criminal investigation, they could not find a report on file nor locate a record of receiving the agency's ES-1019, Notification to Law Enforcement. The Unit was subsequently put in touch with a detective and facilitated further exchange of information between agencies. The local law enforcement agency investigated, determined criminal jurisdiction lay out-of-state and referred information to that jurisdiction.
- SRS issued a finding substantiating the sexual abuse of a child by two perpetrators. The incident occurred over one year prior to the finding being issued and one perpetrator was charged and convicted. There was no record of criminal charges

filed against the second perpetrator. Upon inquiry by the Unit, SRS reported that though they had forwarded additional compelling evidence to the County Attorney, they had not shared such with law enforcement. At that time, they indicated they would do so. When the Unit later followed up with law enforcement on the status of their investigation, it was determined to have stalled with no further action after the victim was relocated by the child placing agency contracted to monitor her foster care case while in SRS custody. As such, her whereabouts were unknown and she was not interviewed by the detective. The Unit facilitated further communication between the agencies. As of the writing of this report, the victim's location was provided to law enforcement, who planned to conduct an immediate interview and forward case information to the County Attorney for charging. Due to the pending nature of this matter, the Unit has chosen to withhold county identification.

- In Neosho County, a step-mother was being investigated for physical abuse. During the investigation, the worker went to the home to conduct further interviews and was told by an unidentified Hispanic male that the father had moved with the children to another city within the state. There was no effort to verify a location for the family in that city to determine child safety, and no verification that the step-parent was no longer in the home. No report was made to law enforcement to either investigate this incident or complete a welfare check in the other city. The finding was not forwarded to the County Attorney for review. Upon inquiry by the Unit, SRS followed up and indicated that they had learned the couple had reconciled and their case remained open for assessment and services. They further reported that they had since forwarded information to law enforcement and the County Attorney.

Failure of Facilities or State Agencies to Report to Law Enforcement

Abuse reports to state agencies where a crime had occurred or appeared to have occurred were not originally forwarded to law enforcement to determine whether criminal investigation was warranted. ANE Unit involvement ultimately resulted in further criminal investigation and charges in some cases.

In support:

- An Ottawa County Long Term Care Unit employee was witnessed by multiple staff to physically and emotionally abuse more than one resident and created a climate of fear. Though the facility completed an internal investigation and terminated the

employee, they did not make a report to law enforcement. Upon completion of investigation by KDOA and issuance of finding placing the perpetrator on the Nurse Aide Registry, KDOA also did not provide information to law enforcement. When the Unit brought this to the attention of KDOA, the agency immediately acted and forwarded information to the local law enforcement agency in that jurisdiction. This case is further referenced on page 21.

- In Shawnee County, a one-year-old child was reported to be a victim of medical neglect by his mother. The child was only seen by the social worker once at the outset of the investigation in July. He was not seen by his doctor until the following January, when Failure to Thrive was still an identified concern. The family was reported to have informed the doctor of intent to move to Texas and subsequently did so prior to the completion of the investigation. The whereabouts and well-being of the child were unknown. Though SRS provided information to Texas Child Protective Services in the event the perpetrator applied for aid in that state, no information was supplied to local law enforcement in an attempt to verify the safety of the child. The Unit was able to share information available in SRS records regarding the family's possible location with the Texas Attorney General's Office. As a result, the family was located and the child's well-being verified. This case is further referenced on page 25.
- In Wyandotte County, SRS issued a finding of physical abuse of a child by a parent. Though the child's injuries were photographed, the abuse was not reported to law enforcement. Upon inquiry by the Unit, the worker recognized the oversight and immediately made a report. However, this report contains no mention of photographic evidence of injury being obtained or provided by SRS. The Unit continues to monitor law enforcement actions in this case.

Failure to Inform KDHE

Abuse reports provided to SRS were not further provided to KDHE as required by statute. ANE Unit involvement ultimately resulted in licensure action in some instances.

In support:

- SRS issued a finding substantiating sexual abuse of a foster child by the foster parent's biological son. They did not notify KDHE, who licenses foster homes, of their finding. Upon the Unit contacting KDHE, they confirmed they were unaware of the finding. KDHE reported the foster home closed subsequent to the finding

and they would make a note in their files to pursue their own investigation if the family reapplied for licensing.

- Previous SRS practice has been only to notify KDHE of reports if the perpetrators were the licensed foster parents. After discussion with KDHE staff, further communication between KDHE and SRS resulted in a change in SRS policy effective January 2010. SRS now agrees to notify KDHE of all reports of abuse occurring within licensed foster homes, regardless of who is the perpetrator.



In calls received from the public where no previous report had been made, ANE Unit involvement provided the means to generate an intake to the SRS Protection Reporting Center or to KDOA and follow up was completed by the ANE Unit to determine the resolution of the report. The Unit was also able to provide referrals to community resources where appropriate.

It is important to state that although significant hours are spent by the ANE Unit reviewing and confirming actions on substantiated cases, a large number of the cases seem to have been reported, assessed and investigated as would be expected. We do not wish to minimize the efforts undertaken by involved agencies to do what is necessary to protect children and vulnerable adults in Kansas.

While the bulk of reports come into the ANE Unit from substantiated or confirmed findings reported by the investigating agency, those situations where a finding has not been made or where the case may still need further investigation create the bulk of the work. Original findings are recorded and cases are tracked for outcomes. Disposition information is primarily obtained through direct contact with the agencies, prosecutors' offices and through online court information.





CONCERNS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The ANE Unit continues to have the following concerns indicated in last year's annual report which remain unaddressed:

Relations Between Caregivers and Their Patients

Of great concern is the safety of citizens who are dependent on others for their care. The ANE Unit has heard from constituents who worry about the well-being of their family members when they are dependent on others to meet their daily needs.

Though those who hold professional licenses may face disciplinary action and loss of license for any act of abuse, neglect or exploitation confirmed by agencies like SRS and KDOA, criminal prosecution may be hampered regarding a vulnerable adult and their ability to give consent.

- **Recommendation:** The ANE Unit encourages legislation that would legally prohibit caregivers from engaging in sexual relations with their patients/clients, regardless of that person's ability to give consent.

Cases Substantiated by SRS For Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation

During the last reporting period, the ANE Unit identified inconsistency in the written materials utilized by the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services to define the terms "substantiated" and "unsubstantiated" with regard to their findings.

The SRS Policy and Procedure Manual section 2500 defined "unsubstantiated" as "the facts or circumstances do not provide clear and convincing evidence to meet the KSA and KAR definition of abuse or neglect; or *there is clear and convincing evidence that abuse or neglect did occur based on the KSA and KAR definitions, but there is not clear and convincing evidence to conclude that the perpetrator should not be permitted to reside, work or regularly volunteer in a child care facility.*" Though this definition is contained in a brochure provided to families at the outset of an investigation, the definition attached to the Notice of Department Finding only stated a finding was unsubstantiated if there was "evidence that the maltreatment did not occur or (2) there is not enough evidence (using the standard clear and convincing) that a reasonable person would conclude that it did occur." Though the Unit began seeing the PPM Manual definition on the Notice of Department Finding in January of 2010, use is inconsistent and the old definition continues to appear on forms used as recently as December 2010.

The terms themselves are often misconstrued by families and those who work within the system. By their very nature (and according to Webster's Dictionary) 'substantiate' means to "establish or strengthen as with new evidence or facts" whereas 'unsubstantiate' means "unsupported by other evidence." Therefore, it is generally accepted when SRS unsubstantiates an allegation, they have determined it didn't happen or is not supported by evidence. When to the contrary, SRS may find that a perpetrator DID commit an act of abuse or neglect towards a child, but they are NOT determined to be inappropriate to reside, work or regularly volunteer in a child care facility. The Unit has continued to encounter surprise among law enforcement, attorneys and even social workers outside of SRS when presenting this information in training.

- Recommendation: The Unit recommends using the term "unsubstantiated" as "evidence that maltreatment did not occur or there is not enough evidence (using the standard clear and convincing) that a reasonable person would conclude that it did occur." Another term should be used when "there is clear and convincing evidence that abuse or neglect did occur based on the KSA and KAR definitions, but there is not clear and convincing evidence to conclude that the perpetrator should not be permitted to reside, work or regularly volunteer in a child care facility."

Findings Not Reported to Law Enforcement

The Unit identified this as a concern during the last reporting period and continues to see it as an obstacle in fully addressing the abuse of children and vulnerable adults and holding perpetrators accountable.

As we have previously recognized, we believe the social service agencies responsible for investigating claims of abuse, neglect and exploitation provide a valuable service in protecting the safety and well-being of those who are targeted. However, the civil remedies available to these agencies in the form of license suspensions and revocations, arranging guardianships and removing children, among other things, is only one cog in the wheel of keeping citizens safe and stopping abuse. By failing to report potential crimes to law enforcement, the criminal justice system is prevented from conducting its own investigation. Further, failing to report to law enforcement can actually aid perpetrators in keeping their abuse secret. While criminal convictions are a matter of public record, placement on civil registries is not.

In support:

- In Neosho County, two foster children reported their foster father would use handcuffs on them and sometimes cuff them to a bed. Two other foster children in the home, as well as three biological children corroborated this statement. Allegations of physical abuse were unsubstantiated due to a lack of visible marks or bruises on the children and the foster

parents were substantiated for lack of supervision and emotional abuse. No report was made to law enforcement by SRS. Later another finding was issued regarding yet another child in the home who reported being handcuffed and having her hands duct taped behind her. KDHE did receive notice of these findings and the home was closed. This finding was later reversed on appeal. It is questionable if this reversal would have occurred had this case been investigated by a law enforcement agency.

- In Geary County, a worker observed injuries to a child's face and photographed them as documentation. The perpetrator admitted striking her child causing injury but didn't consider it abuse. No report was made to law enforcement by SRS.
- In Johnson County, a worker observed a child with fingernail marks and multiple bruises. He reported being hit multiple times with a utensil causing it to break. Despite the parents having a history of similar behavior with another child in 2008 and their insistence their actions were not excessive or unreasonable, stating physical pain was the only way to get through to him, no police report was made by SRS.
- In Johnson County, a child reported being strangled by her father. There was indication that at least three witnesses saw her with marks or bruises on her neck after it occurred. Only one was interviewed by SRS and no report was made to law enforcement.
- In Johnson County, a child was struck in the mouth by his step-father, who admitted his actions. The worker observed bruising, swelling and dried blood on the child's lip. Despite the parents minimizing their actions and his mother's continued statement about wanting "to beat the crap out of" another child, no report was made to law enforcement. Six months later the unit received a subsequent finding of physical abuse of the same child and emotional abuse of two others. This second incident appears to have been investigated after the children reported the incident to police in Walmart.
- In Johnson County, a father was substantiated for physical and emotional abuse. He admitted kicking his son and told the worker he "probably" left bruises. There were previous investigations for physical abuse and the father admitted throwing his kids to the floor and leaving marks and bruises on them in the past. His daughter represented concerns about sexual abuse and was afraid to be alone with her father. There was no indication of a recommendation for services or CINC, but noted a "hope" that the judge ruling in a divorce would follow recommendations to restrict contact between the children and their father. No police report was made.

- In Finney County, a father was substantiated for physical abuse after family members verified the child was slapped and was bleeding as a result. The family reported a previous incident where the child was kicked and strangled leaving marks on the face, arm and neck. Despite the history indicated, SRS reported no police report was made because the incidents occurred in the past and they felt there were no immediate safety concerns.
- In Shawnee County, a physical abuse finding was issued after the children reported being duct taped to chairs and having their mouths taped shut. This was corroborated by an adult family member in the home who claimed an inability to intervene on behalf of the children. The parents minimized their actions and no police report was made. In information sent to the Unit, the worker noted “no law enforcement involvement needed.”
- In Jackson County, a child was hospitalized for ingestion of prescription medication and the parent was substantiated for lack of supervision. It was the second such incident in six months, yet no police report was made for investigation of child endangerment or any other applicable offense.
- In Miami County, a mother was substantiated for physical abuse after she pushed or dropped her child while intoxicated. The worker observed the child with a large bump on the back of her head the following day and the child reported the mother had also put a pillow over a toddler sibling’s mouth to keep him quiet. No police report was made, the children were not removed from the home. One week later, the mother was arrested for DUI and Child Endangerment after she was alleged to have been driving drunk with her children in the car.
- In Reno County, a daycare center office administrator was reported by other staff to have forced food into the mouth of a child and then held her hand over his mouth causing him to vomit. It was reported she spanked the child and then told him to clean up his mess. This was not reported to law enforcement until the Unit inquired, prompting review by a supervisor. However, upon Unit follow up with law enforcement, it was determined that the assigned detective had taken no action because SRS had previously forwarded their finding to the County Attorney. The Unit continues to inquire regarding actions in this matter.
- In Johnson County, a father was substantiated for physical abuse after it was determined he hit the child on the bottom with an object, picked her up and then pushed her across the floor. She was observed to have bruises on her knees, her ankle and above her bottom on her back. Grandparents were present and supported the actions of the father, who had

multiple previous unsubstantiated cases where he was listed as a perpetrator. No police report was made.

These cases have continued to be staffed with SRS. The Department believes they are fulfilling their statutory requirement to report to law enforcement by notifying the “chief law enforcement officer” in their jurisdiction: the district/county attorney.


It remains a concern that while some child cases may be forwarded to the juvenile Child in Need of Care divisions within the district/county attorney’s office, if these cases have not been reported to a law enforcement agency for criminal investigation, they may not be screened for criminal charges. Further, though some juvenile CINC divisions within the county/district attorney’s offices may refer appropriate cases to their criminal division for charging, not all offices have an internal practice for this as a matter of routine. Additionally, critical evidence of the incident could be lost by the time the case is reviewed by the district/county attorney’s office and referred back to a law enforcement agency.

The ANE Unit believes it is more in keeping with the criminal justice process for those reports to be made to the appropriate local police departments or county sheriffs in addition to forwarding to the county attorney.

Similar concerns exist when nursing home administrators fail to report potential crimes to law enforcement agencies. The Unit identified multiple such cases, including one in Dickinson County where the administrator fulfilled her statutory obligation to make the report, but refused to provide law enforcement with the names of employees who could corroborate the allegation of Theft and perhaps offer testimony to the offense. As a result, law enforcement could take no action. In another case in Shawnee County, the administrator made her own determination as to what constituted a crime by failing to report an incident to law enforcement where a staff person grabbed a resident by her wrists and pushed her down a hall to her room. The resident was later found to have bruises on her wrists. The incident was witnessed by multiple staff, but the administrator said she didn’t think it was a crime and that the resident bruised easily. Therefore, the facility did not report to law enforcement.

Administrators do make reports to the Kansas Department on Aging which may take action with regard to licensure if their investigations result in a finding of abuse, neglect or exploitation. Though KDOA will report to law enforcement at the time of intake if a crime is apparent, there seems to be no process for making those reports at a later date if additional information comes to light.

- **Recommendation:** The Unit recommends dual reporting by constituents and by all mandated reporters both to the appropriate state agencies and to local law enforcement when there is a belief a crime may have occurred.



Mandated reporters may feel they've fulfilled their obligation by reporting to the appropriate agency with the authority to issue findings. Often, there is an assumption that all criminal activity will be reported to the law enforcement agency with jurisdiction to investigate and forward complaints for criminal charging. The ANE Unit sees many cases where the opportunity for criminal prosecution is missed. In order to fill this gap, the unit recommends dual reporting of potential crimes by mandated reporters and the public not only to SRS, KDOA and KDHE, but also to local law enforcement authorities. Further, those agencies should also report all potential crimes to law enforcement authorities in a timely manner.

Referral Process for Findings That Are Referred to Law Enforcement In Adult Cases

The Unit has identified a significant opportunity for cases to “fall through the cracks” when cases involving abuse of vulnerable adults are referred to law enforcement. For SRS and KDOA, this referral process involves sending written notice to a law enforcement agency. However, for the most part, there is no follow up to these documents to verify they were even received, let alone acted upon.

Adult Protective Services is mandated to report possible criminal acts to law enforcement. APS workers complete an ES-1019, Notification to Law Enforcement. This may be sent to law enforcement at the outset of an APS investigation and again upon completion to inform of a finding. This form may include a lengthy summary, with supporting documentation attached, or more often contain only a few sentences with instructions for law enforcement to contact the worker for additional information. These may be faxed to a contact point within a law enforcement agency and though some workers may be excellent at following up with law enforcement about documenting a report, others feel a fax containing minimal information fulfills their reporting requirements according to policy.

During tracking of these cases, the Unit has great difficulty first in verifying whether the law enforcement agency has even received a 1019 and supporting information and then in determining what actions have been taken. Often we are receiving the information after some significant time has passed which adds to the difficulty if there is not a documented report on file. The Unit has requested the format by which the various regions or counties submit 1019's to their local law enforcement agency in effort to make this process easier. SRS has maintained the process varies within the regions and may be submitted in any manner, including by fax, by mail or by email. The Unit has also not been able to determine a consistent contact point within law enforcement agencies to receive such information. They may be sent to the attention of individuals or divisions within the departments. Further, because workers do not always follow up with law enforcement to ensure the information is received, it can often cause information to be lost in transition and hinder efforts at addressing abuse.

In support:

- In Elk County, the Unit had multiple contacts with the Sheriff's Department in regard to more than one case of adult ANE. The Sheriff was not able to find any record of receiving information on these cases and even confirmed with the local police department. Multiple requests were sent by the Unit for SRS to resubmit information to the Sheriff's Department before we were able to verify it was received.
- In Labette County, the local police department had no record of receiving a 1019. The Unit contacted SRS and requested the material be resubmitted. The Unit continues to track further actions/outcomes.

- In Sumner County, a local police department had no record of receiving a 1019. The Unit has requested SRS provide information on when, to whom and how the information was submitted. This continues to be investigated by the Unit in order to get the appropriate information to law enforcement.
- In Crawford County, APS confirmed exploitation of multiple residents of a group home who were victims of Theft by a staff person. Though 1019's were reportedly sent to law enforcement, SRS indicated no police report was taken on the incident. When the Unit followed up with the local police department, we were informed that an officer is called in to respond whenever a 1019 is received and that even if there is no investigation, there is record of the call. We were informed no record could be located for this incident searching their database by address, facility name or perpetrator's name.
- In Crawford County, a staff person at a facility was confirmed for hitting a resident and pulling her hair. No police report was made and SRS sent a 1019 at the conclusion of their investigation. Unit follow up with local law enforcement could not find any record of a report being documented or a 1019 received.

The ANE Unit has spoken to members of law enforcement who express frustration when they are not involved at the outset of an investigation. Being notified after APS has completed its own investigation hampers the ability of law enforcement to conduct a criminal investigation when witnesses have had the time to "get their stories straight." Further, law enforcement is not always provided adequate information to initiate a criminal investigation.

There has been similar difficulty tracking actions on cases referred by KDOA. However, in those cases, there is consistency in that all of their referrals are directed to the attention of the Sheriff or Chief of Police in the jurisdiction.

In support:

- In the case of ANE at an Ottawa County Long Term Care Unit (referenced earlier in the report) the Unit has attempted to track actions by the local law enforcement agency. After inquiry by the Unit, KDOA reported forwarding information to the police department. An officer there has indicated he has been unable to locate a report or any record of receiving such information.

- **Recommendation:** The Unit recommends all state agencies providing information to local law enforcement agencies follow up these referrals in a timely fashion to ensure the information is received. Further, local law enforcement agencies should develop internal policies so that staff who might receive such notification recognize the purpose and nature of the forms and routes them appropriately for investigation.

In addition, though SRS has maintained its workers are not law enforcement and are not equipped to conduct a criminal investigation, cases have been found where they sent the information on their investigation, but informed law enforcement that they do not need to take action.

In support:

- In Cowley County, a detective followed up on a 1019 received and was told by an APS worker that no criminal charges would be necessary as APS had taken care of things and the funds were repaid.
- In Sedgwick County, an APS worker contacted a local police department and told an officer she needed a “case number so she could present the case to the Attorney General.” The officer told the worker she would need to complete a statement first. The officer faxed a statement to the worker and then followed up with phone calls when the statement wasn’t received. At that time, he was told the victim had relocated out of state. Despite it being indicated a Battery had taken place, officers were not notified at the outset of the APS investigation, when the victim could have been contacted and interviewed by law enforcement.
- In Sedgwick, County, the Unit followed up on a case where APS provided a copy of a 1019 and a police report number. When the Unit requested a copy of that police report, it indicated only that the officer was contacted by the worker to issue a case number so it could be provided to the District Attorney. The report reflected no investigation was completed. In the narrative, the officer noted he “has no idea what SRS does with this information” Paperwork provided to the Unit by SRS indicated they did NOT forward their finding to the District Attorney and this was confirmed upon inquiry.
- In Harvey County, APS issued a finding of neglect based on a husband and caregiver taking his wife out of a facility against medical advice. Information received from SRS indicated the perpetrator yelled at, cursed and threatened staff. SRS indicated the victim, who has dementia, “expressed fear of him and that she did not want to go with him.” The perpetrator reportedly stated he was going to discard her medication, didn’t seem to have filled all prescriptions and refused home health services. SRS indicated this was the fourth finding issued against this perpetrator and they did not send him a notice of finding for

fear of the victim's safety. However, when they notified law enforcement, SRS reported they "didn't need to do anything at this time."

- In Shawnee County, where there was indication of physical injury to a child, the worker provided information to law enforcement but the documented report indicated the officer asked the worker if she needed any further assistance, to which she responded that "she would not request any criminal investigation be conducted at this time."
 - In Harvey County, a patient at a hospital was suffering from dementia and became agitated. Her husband was observed by staff to raise his fist to her. When told by staff his behavior was unacceptable, he reportedly indicated that it was okay and that it frightened her. Before staff could act further, he was witnessed to strike his wife in the stomach. Staff monitored his visits and APS recommended he attend a support group for caregivers. A 1019 was sent to law enforcement with a cover sheet attached that indicated "APS does not see any need (for) law enforcement response. This report is being sent for information purposes only."
- Recommendation: In such cases, the Unit would recommend that law enforcement agencies act on the information provided and make their own determination as to whether the case merits criminal investigation and would meet criminal statutory violations.

The ANE Unit does not believe that ALL cases resulting in findings of abuse, neglect or exploitation will rise to the level of a crime. Even if the cases meet criteria set forth in a criminal statute, there may be extenuating circumstances that may justifiably cause a prosecutor not to charge a criminal offense. However, law enforcement agencies should be allowed to make that determination. They, and subsequently, the county/district attorney cannot act with regard to criminal penalties if the information is not presented to them in a timely fashion.

Communications with SRS

Exchange of information with SRS continues to provide some challenges in many areas. Internal policy has continued to direct workers NOT to respond directly to Unit inquiries, but rather to provide information to supervisors and/or program administrators in the regions. The time it takes for responses to be funneled through multiple staff has in many cases significantly increased the time it takes for information to be shared with the Unit. In some cases, it has also resulted in the Unit having to make repeated inquiries to SRS staff when responses haven't been received at all. The delay in receiving sufficient information to determine further Unit action extends the amount of time required by the Unit to subsequently follow up with other agencies and can result in cases being open longer.

Information the Unit commonly has to request includes:

- Confirmation of the safety and custody/placement of the child or vulnerable adult.
- In lieu of any indication of court action, whether services were recommended or accessed.
- Cover sheets designed to provide basic information are often incomplete. Further, they may indicate a lack of law enforcement involvement where there is indication of such in a narrative. This requires further follow up and inquiry by the Unit for confirmation or clarity.
- Narratives establishing a basis for finding may reference additional incidents with no action, status, or outcome of those incidents noted. Inquiring further in these instances has revealed earlier findings that should have been received by the Unit, but were not found in our records.

We do appreciate those workers and region supervisors who are eager to provide prompt and accurate information. The Unit continues to meet quarterly with SRS to discuss ongoing concerns.

Shelters and Mandated Reporting

The Unit reviewed two cases in close proximity where children were abused while the family was housed at homeless shelters. One occurred in Miami County and the other in Shawnee County. Had shelter staff been mandated to report perhaps earlier intervention could have occurred. The Unit recommends all agencies receiving state funds and providing shelter services be mandated reporters.

Fleeing the State to Avoid Action

The Unit identified multiple cases where during the course of an investigation, the family relocated to another state. As a result, the Unit identified gaps in service that cause continued concern for the safety of victims in these cases.

In support:

- In Cherokee County, SRS investigated a case of physical abuse of siblings by their father and his girlfriend that each occurred on separate dates. A law enforcement officer initially responded to the complaint regarding the second incident. He noted the child appeared to have marks consistent with a spanking and photographed her injuries. Another child in the home reported witnessing the abuse on both occasions. Though the children were placed in police protective custody at the time, after consulting with the County Attorney, SRS records indicate the officer returned the children to their father pending a court hearing provided his girlfriend is out of the home. By the time SRS received the report three days later and attempted to interview the children, the father had moved them to Missouri. The

father refused all services and denied SRS access to the children.

The Unit is concerned that the father was allowed to remove the children from the jurisdiction during a CINC proceeding, thereby denying SRS the opportunity to interview the children, conduct assessments and provide the best information to the court. Further, though noting physical injury, it seems the officer documented a report for Child In Need of Care only and did not conduct a criminal investigation. Finally, the CINC case was handled by a Special Prosecutor because of a conflict due to an alleged perpetrator's association with county attorney staff. While we commend the office for recognizing and addressing a potential conflict, it appears no one ever reviewed this matter for criminal charging against either perpetrator. When contacted by the Unit, the special prosecutor noted in hindsight perhaps that should have been considered, however she was only contracted to handle the Child in Need of Care matter.

- In Montgomery County, a mother was confirmed as a perpetrator of medical neglect of her child. In their finding, SRS reported the mother moved out of state and as such, SRS was “unsure of her status and if her needs are being met.” Upon inquiry by the Unit, SRS further reported that the mother had returned to the jurisdiction and indicated she left her child in the care of her mother in Atlanta, Georgia. When the Unit further inquired whether the safety of the child had been determined in that jurisdiction, SRS only reported that a finding letter had been sent to the grandmother and it was not returned. SRS later indicated that they did “not believe it was necessary for the safety to be determined” in Georgia.
 - An additional example of this concern is the Shawnee County case referenced fully earlier in the report. A mother being investigated for medical neglect of a one-year-old child left the state in the middle of the investigation and went to Texas. Though SRS provided information to Texas Child Protective Services in the event the perpetrator applied for aid in Texas, no information was supplied to local law enforcement in an attempt to verify the safety of the child. The Unit was able to provide information to the Texas Attorney General and request law enforcement assistance in verifying the safety of the child.
- **Recommendation:** When SRS has possible information on the location of a child who is the subject of a current investigation, and that child has been moved to another jurisdiction, the Unit recommends policy be developed requiring workers to file a report with child protection authorities and law enforcement in that jurisdiction.

In conclusion, the Unit recognizes each agency within the system serves a different function and yet a common goal: the protection and safety of children and vulnerable adults. In a time of reduced manpower and increased caseloads, this is often difficult to accomplish to its fullest extent.

The one factor that is a common thread through all areas of concern is the need for clear communication. This includes not only providing information to other agencies, but following up to assure that information is received by the person or agency that is best suited to effectively address the abuse, neglect or exploitation. Social workers, service providers, law enforcement officers and district/county attorney staff often give their best individual efforts. While the various agencies work well together for the most part, there is considerable opportunity for cases and therefore people, to get lost while moving through the system. If one link in the chain doesn't connect to the next, the systemic response falls apart. While fulfilling our own function, we must recognize the opportunity for another agency to contribute to the common goal and trust in their ability to do so.
